## Solo Exhibitions

Gordon has had major solo exhibitions at Tate Liverpool (2000), Museum of Contemporary Art, Los Angeles (2001), The Hayward Gallery, London (2002) and Van Abbemuseum, Eindhoven (2003). In 2005, he curated The Vanity of Allegory, an exhibition at the Deutsche Guggenheim, Berlin and released the film Zidane: A 21st Century Portrait. Further solo exhibitions include Superhumanatural at the National Gallery of Scotland (2006), Between Darkness and Light at the Kunstmuseum Wolfsburg, Wolfsburg (2007), and Timeline at MoMA, New York (2006), Lambert Collection, and the Palais des Papes, Avignon (July 2008), DOX, Prague (June 2009), Galerie Eva Presenhuber, Zürich (August 2009), DVIR Gallery, Tel Aviv (September 2009), and Art and the Sublime at the TATE Britain, London (March 2010), Gagosian Gallery, London (February 2011), Yvon Lambert, Paris (April 2011), MMK, Frankfurt (November 2011) and MOCA, Los Angeles (2012). His work Henry Rebel was shown at the 43 Basel Art Unlimited, Basel. Solo shows in 2012 included the Akademie der Künste, Berlin and Gagosian Gallery, New York. In 2013 Douglas Gordon had solo exhibitions at the Tel Aviv Museum of Art, Tel Aviv and Blain Southern, Berlin, Galerie Eva Presenhuber in Zürich and Museum Folkwang, Essen. In 2014 Gordon has had a solo show at ACCA, Melbourne. In December 2014 Douglas Gordon and pianist Hélène Grimaud have joined forces to explore the beauty of water in an extraordinary performance at Armory on Park, New York. The collaboration continued when Gordon directed the theatre performance Neck of the Woods starring Charlotte Rampling and Hélène Grimaud at the 2015 MIF - Manchester International Festival, Manchester. In 2016 Gordon released his film I had nowhere to go, a portrait of Jonas Mekas, the godfather of American avant-garde cinema. Solo exhibitions in 2016 with Galerie Eva Presenhuber, Zurich, Gagosian Gallery Geneva and Paris Photo. In 2017 Gordon presented I had nowhere to go at Documenta 14 in Athens and Kassel and had a solo exhibition with Gagosian New York and at the Scottish National Portrait Gallery in Edinburgh.

In 2018 Douglas Gordon curated the exhibition The Inventory of my Desire at Gallery Kamel Mennour in Paris and screened his latest video work Portrait of Janus at St Columbs Hall in Londonderry in collaboration with Locus+. In September 2019 ARoS Museum in Aarhus will host a solo exhibition of Douglas Gordon's works.

His film works have been invited to the Festival de Cannes, Toronto International Film Festival (TIFF), Venice Film Festival, Edinburgh International Film Festival, BFI London Film Festival, Festival del Film Locarno, New York Film Festival, among many others.

Gordon was the 1996 recipient of the Turner Prize and the Kunstpreis Niedersachsen, Kunstverein Hannover, Hannover. In 1997 he was awarded the Premio 2000 at the 47th Esposizione Internazionale d'Arte, La Biennale di Venezia, Venice and received the DAAD Stipend in Berlin. In 1998 he was presented with the Hugo Boss Prize at the Guggenheim Museum in SoHo, New York as well as with the Central Kunstpreis, Kölnischer Kunstverein, Cologne and the Lord Provost's Award, Glasgow City Council, Glasgow. In May 2008 he won the Roswitha Haftmann Prize awarded by the Kunsthaus Zürich and he was the recipient of the Käthe-Kollwitz Prize 2012 awarded by the Akademie der Künste, Berlin. In 2012, Gordon became a Commandeur dans l'ordre des Arts et des Lettres, awarded the title by the French Cultural Minister in Berlin on behalf of the French Republic. In 2016 the Research Centre for Film and Narrative Palermo awarded Gordon with the Efebo d'Oro Prize. In 2018 he became a Corresponding Fellow of the Royal Society of Edinburgh, Edinburgh and a Member of the Akademie der Künste, Berlin.

In 2008 Gordon was Juror at the 65th International Venice Film Festival, La Biennale di Venezia, Venice and in 2012 he was the Jury president of CinemaXXI at the 07th Rome Film Festival, Festival Internazionale del Film di Roma, Rome.
